History and the Future Commonwealth;
Manning Clark's Vision of Australia 1962-
1991

For Manning Clark, the writing of history was inseparable from the quest for an Australian identity – to understand the past was to find out 'who we are' and 'where we came from'. From 1962, with the publication of Volume One of his six volume *A History of Australia* (1962-1987), Clark devoted himself tirelessly to writing Australia's 'story' and communicating his work and ideas to a wide audience. His public persona exuded a combination of professorial authority and disarming intimacy, his comments often delivered in seer-like pronouncements. Clark was a public intellectual and historian who was concerned with Australia's future as much as he was with its past.

In this lecture, Mark McKenna will chart how Australia changed dramatically in the 25-year period that Clark wrote *A History of Australia* and explains the precise nature of Clark's contribution. What was his vision of Australian identity and the role of the historian that so captivated Australians at the time? What was the place of Indigenous Australians in this vision and the future Commonwealth, both for Clark himself and for his contemporaries? And finally, what has become of Clark's project today

Creating the Commonwealth

The main concern of the Constitution of 1901 was the separation of powers between the States. The Constitution very much reflected the late nineteenth century in its views on race, female suffrage and its commitment to the British Crown.

Rail and ship were the main means of transport and few had a telephone. Ahead was rapid technological change: radio, aircraft and television; a reliance on manufacturing rather than agriculture; and demands for Indigenous recognition. Citizens were confronted with two World Wars and the Great Depression.


